

Background

- Maternal education can be an indicator of family social location¹
- Higher educational attainment provides access to economic and social stability which may give mothers the space and knowledge for conversations about sex²
- Parent-child relationships are multidimensional and have the power to shape identity development³ Increased sexual communication between parents and adolescents is associated with positive sexual
- health outcomes⁴

Methodology and Measures

Analytic Sample: Limited to young women who completed AddHealth survey Waves I and III and reported whether they were sexually active, n=2,437 IV:

- Maternal Education: reported educational attainment in four categories: < HS degree, HS degree, some college, college degree
- **Parent-Child Closeness:** scale (satisfaction 1-5) constructed based on four questions about general quality of parental relationships in Wave I **Parental Attitudes About Sex:** Scale constructed using two questions regarding parental approval of sexual activity and birth control use at Wave I

Adolescent response, not parent DV:

Contraception: contraception choices reported at Wave III

Three categories: no contraception, less effective, more effective






Research Questions


