Methodology

- Clips of Québécois locals
 - Older White woman
 - Young multiracial woman
 - Middle-aged Asian man
- Clips of Americans speaking with a “standard” accent
 - Young nonbinary White person
 - Middle-aged Latino man
 - Middle-aged Black woman

Findings

High laxed vowels (voyelles fermées relâchées)

- “I will live my life to the fullest”
 - [wɪl]
- “On a la ville”
 - [vɪl]

Diphthongization

- “...Probably ‘cause I eat a lot”
 - [aɪ̯]
- “On a la montagne”
 - [mɔ̯.taɛ̯n̩]

Cot-caught merger

- Lack of distinction between the vowels in “caught” and “cot”
 - [kat̩]

Affrication

- /t/ and /d/ followed by /i/ and /y/
 - “Toutes sortes de differents places à aller”
 - [d̩i.fe.βɛ̯]

Québécois importance


- Francophone diversity
- Culture and identity
- Phenomena remain across age, gender, race/ethnicity, and class

Standard American accent

- Less of a “neutral/negative accent” as the Anglophone standard, compared to the French Parisian standard accent

Conclusion

Québécois French and American English share several phonetic phenomena including diphthongs and lax high vowels. These phenomena are especially important to Québécois culture, which prides itself on its Francophone status within North America.



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
